Das Loft (Sofitel): A great restaurant and bar at the waterfront with windows from floor to ceiling and therefore a beautiful view over the city. The ceiling has been designed by the Swiss artist Pipilotti Rist

Dachboden (25-hours Hotel): A charmingly-designed bar with good music (DJ), located close to Ringstrasse and therefore, to historical buildings like Parliament, Town Hall and Museumsquartier. The terrace offers a great view. At the park surrounding the building you can find a booth offering delicious burgers.

Badeschiff: An ship anchored on the Danube, right in the city center – eat, drink and use the pool to have a swim on a hot day or evening (close to "Das Loft") https://www.badeschiff.at Franz-Josefs-Kai 4 → U1/U4 Schwedenplatz

Donauturm: The tower is a Viennese landmark, a technical masterpiece, a stylish reinterpretation of the 1960s. The express lift takes you to the viewing terrace at a height of 150 meters for an unforgettable 360° panorama, there is also a restaurant at the top. OPEN-AIR VENUES

Museumsquartier (MQ):

The thoroughly renovated buildings used to be home to the royal riding school and horse stables, nowadays they are housing several museums of contemporary fine arts and a number of bars and restaurants.



The buildings open up into a square, where you can enjoy music (DJ) and open-air activities like authors` readings or boule game. Some extra feature of MQ is "Enzi", an outdoor piece of furniture specially designed to relax within these extraordinary surroundings → U3 Volkstheater https://www.mgw.at/en/

Palmenhaus: Designed in the 1820th as a greenhouse, today's Palmenhaus has been rebuilt and reassigned many times until it was reopened at the end of 1900: The main part has been turned into a fancy café-bar-restaurant, the left wing into "house of butterflies" → Tram 1, 2, D or 71 Burgring. https://www.palmenhaus.at/en/ The terrace opens up into Burggarten, a highly frequented hang-out place - on special nights there is a small community dancing Tango in a corner of the park.



Right behind the building a historical Palais housing "Albertina Museum" (a museum of contemporary art) is located, so it seems a good option to combine the visit: https://www.albertina.at/en/home

Summer Stage: When it gets unbearably hot in the city, summer stage seems one of the right places to go. Located directly at the Danube Canal in the shade of trees, it consists of a variety of open-air bars – enjoy cultural events and live music.

A SMALL SELECTION OF MUSEUMS AND EXHIBITIONS

Museum Gugging: In 1954 Dr. Navratil, leading psychiatrist of a ward for mostly chronic schizophrenic patients, used drawing tests for diagnostic purposes. Inspired by the creativity he perceived, he helped his patients developing their talents. In 1969 he managed to connect with Jean Dubuffet, since then the Gugging artists have been internationally renowned for their art-brut talent.



Museum Gugging, a charming place, was opened in 2006, today's performing artists are living next door, in the "House of Artists", https://www.museumgugging.at/en/gugging-art/gugging-artists.

Narrenturm (fools` tower): Originally a home to mentally ill patients, it has become a monument to the history of health care in the late 18th century.

Today it displays the Vienna anatomical-pathological collection, radiating grim charms, https://www.nhm-wien.ac.at/en/narrenturm. The museum is located in the center of university campus, therefore a nice place to meet up and enjoy the adjacent students` pubs. "Altes AKH", ->Tram 43, 44, 5, 33 Lange Gasse.



Sigmund Freud Museum: Berggasse 19 has been Freuds residence for 49 years, until he had to emigrate during the war. The museum displays private as well as practice rooms, guided tours can be booked. https://www.freud-museum.at/en/, -> Tram 1, D Schwarzspanierstrasse

Leopold Museum (Museumsquartier): A display of original, internationally renowned works of the Austrian "Jugendstil"-area, featuring Gustav Klimt, Egon Schiele and Oskar Kokoschka. https://www.leopoldmuseum.org/en -> U3 Volkstheater

TRADITIONAL COFFEESHOPS

Café Jelinek: Just off Mariahilfer Strasse, it seems the perfect place to escape the hustle and bustle of shopping for a few moments. This little café offers everything that Viennese coffee house culture is known for.

Café Sperl: Located between Mariahilfer Strasse and Vienna's famous Naschmarkt, the Café has been offering Viennese coffee house culture since 1880. Café Sperl is perfectly suited for a short break in old Vienna, so have a cup of coffee and a piece of original Sperl Torte or enjoy yourself at one of the billiard tables. Café Hawelka: Not far from Stephansplatz you can find "the Hawelka", one of Vienna's most legendary cafés. Its distinctive charm has made it a popular meeting place for decades – also for famous Austrian and international artists, such as Hans Moser, Udo Jürgens or Andy Warhol. Café Korb: The Café has been founded in 1904, it is situated in the vicinity of Stephansplatz. The owner, actress and performance artist Susanne Widl, keeps hosting the philosophic, psychoanalytic and musical events, the Café has been famous for. Café Prückel: Located on Ringstrasse the Café seems to be impressive due to its qualities as a typical Viennese Café as well as its architecture. PARKS

Schönbrunn: A wide-ranged, neatly groomed park surrounding the Castle of Schönbrunn (guided castle tours available). By a short hike you can reach "Gloriette" to enjoy a good view over the city and have some coffee or "Jause" (snack). https://www.schoenbrunn.at/en/, -> U4 Schönbrunn. The park is also home to the Viennese zoo, https://www.zoovienna.at



Prater: A 15-minutes tramway ride from "Ringstrasse" to Prater offers some impression of different corners of the city. The park is a huge area, including woodland, a small lake, children's playgrounds and meadows to relax and picnic. "Prater Hauptallee", the main alley (4,5 km), is very popular with joggers, bikers and walkers.
